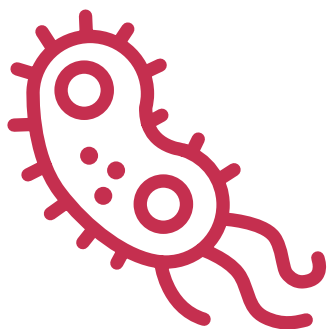

Problems



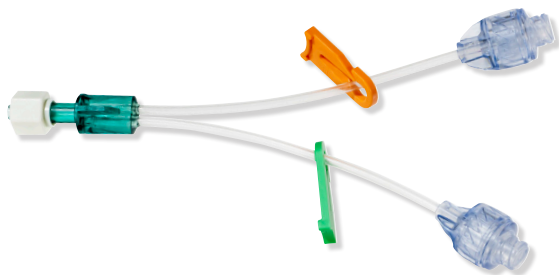
Infection risk
